Since filling the Regional Minster position Annie and I have appreciated your support in prayer, conversation and relationship. You have welcomed us as friends and offered hospitality in many different ways over the course of these first three months. We look forward to deepening partnership in ministry. Our desire is to see the church flourish by reaching people with the gospel, seeing lives transformed and living together on the mission God gives his Church.

In a book of readings entitled, <u>A Guide to Prayer for Ministers and other Servants</u>, this description of the church from Hans Kung is quoted:

"If the Church really sees itself as the people of God, it is obvious that it can never be a static and supra-historical phenomenon, which exists undisturbed by earthly space and historical time. The Church is always and everywhere a living people, gathered through the midst of time. The Church is essentially 'en route', on a journey, a pilgrimage. A Church which pitches its tents without looking out constantly for new horizons, which does not continually strike camp, is being untrue to its calling. The historical nature of the Church is revealed by the fact that it remains the pilgrim people of God. It renews and continues the history of the ancient people of the covenant and fulfills it in the new covenant At the same time it journeys through history, through a time of complex imperfection, towards the final perfection, the eschatological kingdom of God, led by God himself. It is essentially an interim Church, a Church in transition, and therefore not a Church of fear but of expectation and hope: a Church which is directed toward the consummation of the world by God."

This captures the essence of the Church. We are reminded that we are the pilgrim people of God. We must be prepared for changes and developments, flexible in our approach to people and the possibilities for ministry. We want to be eager for new opportunities as God unfolds them before us. We want to be a people looking toward new horizons, continually striking camp, true to our calling.

Over one hundred and sixty years ago there were pioneers who believed cooperation and mutual support was a priority among German Baptists. They were pilgrims - immigrants who understood what it was to strike camp, looking for a new horizon. Once they settled they continued to look for new horizons - planting dozens of congregations throughout the United States and Canada.

I often lack this pioneering spirit. I am more comfortable knowing where my tent will be pitched. I don't want it moved often. I want to sit on the back deck and enjoy my current view of the horizon. I don't want to strike camp. I prefer "end route" to "en route". Playing it safe. Protecting what has been gained. Many of you are like me. Who we are is reflected in our congregations. We have lost a bit of the pioneer spirit that drove our early congregations to reach the next community, next generation and next nation.

There have been times we have been pressed to strike camp. A war breaks out. A building burns. An economy slows down. A pastor transitions. A leadership fails. Financial challenges rise. Demographics change. Culture shifts.

There are times we choose to strike camp. A congregation is planted. Leaders are sent. Finances are sacrificed. Ineffective strategies are abandoned. Preferences are exchanged for priorities. Focus shifts from inside the walls to outside the walls. Urgency replaces complacency. A paradigm shift.

Being reformed into Christ-likeness is not safe by traditional standards. Living on mission involves risk. Paul said, "To live is Christ, to die is gain." That doesn't seem safe. Peter said, "Even if you suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed." That doesn't sound safe. Jesus said, "Whoever wants to save his life will lose it and whoever loses his life for me will find it." That seems scary, not safe.

As Christ followers we are called to strike camp continually. Never getting comfortable but always knowing contentment. Never putting stakes down too deep, yet living on the bedrock of faith. We carry on. We march forward. The Church in transition. Pilgrims. Losers for the sake of Jesus. Hopeful and waiting for the consummation of the Kingdom but living the Kingdom life now.

The work of NorCal is unchanging - we consult churches, counsel people, coach leaders and encourage pastors. This is the ongoing work of the ministry. These are necessary day-to-day activities. This is the fabric of what NorCal is charged to provide. This is necessary and essential to our congregations and leaders. We want to do it well and continue to work to meet the needs of each church as requested.

We will press for change. We will challenge assumptions. We will push to see new congregations formed.

Where is God pressing your congregation to strike camp? We desperately need leaders and churches that will take greater risks in planting churches, multiply congregations and developing leaders.

How will we strategically multiply? Where are we intentionally developing leaders? Who will risk failure without fear?

NorCal exists to come alongside congregations in this expectant journey of hope as we carry on the mission of the Gospel.

May we be pilgrim people, constantly looking toward new horizons, continually striking camp, true to our calling. Working together to accomplish more than we could ever accomplish alone.

Executive Director's

Report to Associations/Regions

Fall 2015

Reviewing the past months truly brings a response of joy from me, knowing that God is working His will and way among our conference of churches in the NAB. Allow me to reflect on just a few of the highlights of the past year:

Staff Transitions:

In January, 2015, Richard Brown joined the staff of the International Office as our Chief Financial Officer. Richard has a rich experience of ministry and financial oversight, having worked for the ministry of World Impact in Los Angeles for the previous 24 years. With great acumen, Richard has quickly begun to upgrade NAB's accounting processes and create a significantly more useful financial reporting system for the executive staff of the International Office.

At the 2015 Triennial in Sacramento, I was elected by the Triennial delegates as the Executive Director/CEO of the North American Baptist Conference. I am both humbled and honored to move into this role on a permanent basis after having served is the Interim Executive Director for 18 months.

I am also thrilled to announce that Stu Streeter has accepted the role of NAB's Vice President of Advancement. He will begin September 1, 2015 and will serve this role in a part-time capacity. Stu is currently a lead pastor/church planter, and will continue that role while helping NAB with fundraising and communications. Stu has a Bachelor's degree in communications, and has worked in professional fundraising, stewardship, and consulting with churches for nearly a decade.

Triennial 2015

The 2015 Triennial Conference in Sacramento, California was a rich time of exploring the theme of "sent." Speakers Dave Johnson, Mark Buchanan, and Reggie McNeal opened God's word and their experiences to those gathered at the Sacramento Convention Center to understand our calling to be a missionary people in our neighborhoods and communities. Missionaries, pastors, and church planters taught a variety of breakout sessions that fleshed out the "sent" theme even further. Authentic community was experienced through fun receptions and group activities. The Women's Ministry Leadership Team hosted a wonderful luncheon for women to explore how they can live as "sent", Taylor Seminary held a reception celebrating their 75th anniversary, and Sioux Falls Seminary hosted a breakfast for alumni and friends.

The International Office received many notes of thanks for this Triennial Conference. Almost uniformly, those attenders commented that the 2015 Triennial Conference was one of the best Triennials ever.

Looking forward, the location of the 2018 Triennial Conference was announced as being in far western Canada (British Columba or Alberta). The specific location is currently being determined.

Organizational Decisions

The General Council in May and the Triennial delegates in July approved various elements of a threeyear transitional period to implement and analyze some new organizational structures intended to make the North American Baptist Conference both more effective and more efficient.

- In May, the General Council voted to require Executive Director, by policy, to establish and utilize a strategy group to help develop and implement high level ministry strategies for the North American Baptist Conference. This group, made up of Regional Ministers, representatives from various NAB Cooperative Organizations, two representatives from the Executive Committee, and a few other key individuals, will begin meeting January 2016.
- 2. Triennial delegates voted to change the number of appointed Executive Committee members from four to eleven, a minimum of which will be two Regional Ministers, and up to four;
- 3. Also, delegates approved General Council voting privileges for those Regional Ministers that are appointed to the Executive Committee.

Direction

There are two critical theological truths that the International Office desires from NAB churches and attenders to own at deep levels. First, each follower of Jesus Christ is a "sent one," joining God on mission to reach his or her neighborhood and community. Second, each church should be looking to reproduce or multiply itself, birthing new and perhaps creative church extensions in communities, associations, and regions. God has called us each to be "sent," both as individuals and churches, going to present and proclaim the gospel.

As we partner together to be a missionary people, "sent" by God in North America and around the world, please take to heart the words of Charles Haddon Spurgeon when he said, "It's not the strength of your faith that saves you, but the strength of Him upon whom you rely." May we all be "sent", relying on the strength of a God who loves us, and calls us to go.

One of the highlights for this year had to be our presence at the Triennial meeting in Sacramento. We were blessed to have Tony and Fabiola Campos (CA Field Coordinator) as the moderator for the main sessions, Eduardo Buldain (Argentina Field Coordinator) as one of the workshop guests for a presentation on partnerships, and we had Paco Damian (Mexico) and Ricardo Ayala (Chicago and El Salvador) working in our both. We had a wonderful opportunity to meet with churches and to share our ministry.

Another highlight is the launch of our new discipleship based church planting initiative in El Salvador. This has the potential to plant a new generation of churches started with new believers and focused on discipleship rather than growth.

Finally, we applied for and received an R-1 visa for a Romanian pastor to move to Salem, Oregon to plant a new church among Hispanics there and then to help us plant multiple new churches in Oregon and Washington.



 - .giving students the opportunity to pursue areas of expertise including, but not limited to, marriage and family therapy, child and adolescent behavior, and mental health counseling
- Sioux Falls Psychological Services is celebrating 40 years of meeting the emotional, spiritual, and relational needs of the region by offering a full range of services for individuals, couples, and families. Their team of multidisciplinary mental health professionals serve through the Therapy and Assessment Clinic, the Child & Adolescent Therapy Clinic, and the Community Counseling Clinic.

message from the president

The 2014-2015 year was remarkable and certainly one to remember. It was a strong academic year for us, graduating 17 students, completing some significant curriculum changes, and increasing our core faculty by almost 50%. Our EP Wahl Centre saw a banner year with a steady increase in participants and new programming. Overall, we are doing well.



Here are some significant recent events of note:

Budget. For the first time in 3 years we have posted a deficit budget. This was due in some degree to a decline in our annual fund donations, but it was largely due to 2014-2015 being a year of reinvesting in the institution, primarily with the hire of new core faculty members and a new Director of the E P Wahl Centre.

Renewed partnership with Sioux Falls Seminary. This year has been an important year for a renewal of NAB partnerships. In order to better fulfill our mission, Taylor is partnering with Sioux Falls Seminary in a host of initiatives including a shared online education platform.

Renewed partnership with Cameroon Baptist Convention. Taylor Seminary, along with the NAB International Office and Sioux Falls Seminary, are working with the CBC and Cameroon Baptist Theological Seminary to create a nationwide theological education platform in Cameroon.

NAB on Mission Together. Taylor is joining other NAB-affiliated organizations in a joint fundraising campaign that advances local and international ministries.

75th Anniversary Celebration. Our year of celebration will continue across western Canada throughout the fall and climax in our Celebration Banquet on Oct. 24th here at Taylor. Please see www.Taylor-Edu.ca for more information, and please plan to attend! I'd love to see you.

Care Lodi :: Fall 2015 Update!

Greetings from the East Side of Lodi!

For those of you who don't know us, **Care Lodi was founded in 2012 with a simple mission: to change a broken neighborhood through the involvement of the local church.** We were responding to this calling from an unusual place: the local police department. Veteran officers called together and told leaders from the local faith community that this neighborhood, with its systemic crime and poverty issues, was by far the most needy in the community. They knew that there wouldn't be long-term change unless new resources were brought to bear.

Enter the church.

Three NAB churches— First Baptist Lodi, Temple Baptist, and Horizon Community—took the call seriously and jumped on board. Soon, several more churches from across denominational lines became involved. Volunteers and resources poured in from these churches, along with help from the police, parks and recreation agency, and other nonprofits.

Today, Care Lodi is an "asset-based community development (ABCD) program geared toward finding local assets within the community who are serious about helping see the neighborhood changed. As an ABCD program, we are staffed by a single, full-time, live-in missionary. Her job is to build lasting friendships in this neighborhood, finding the needs and connecting them to the assets. The vast bulk of the program is run by volunteers from the local church. These are retired teachers, full-time moms, apartment maintenance people, and others who have heard the call and responded.

Through these combined efforts, this year we have reached more than 250 low-income youth and their families from this neighborhood. Of those, we have built a core target group of 40 students from about 20 families. These kids by-and-large come from families where relatives have been involved in gangs. The kids desperately need a different kind of mentoring than what the gangs provide, and that's what we do. We help them with their schoolwork, and have seen several them jump from a 0.0 GPA to 3's and 4's. We provide fun activities for them in the local park,, and police tell us that gang activity in the area decreases dramatically when we are there. We have engaged their parents with programming designed to help them engage the new culture and communicate with their children.

One of the most exciting developments in 2015 has been our connection with a local Spanish-Immersion charter school in the target neighborhood. The principal of this school saw what we were doing and wanted us to get involved. The end-result was that we were able to contract with them to provide an onsite school counselor for three days of the week, who is using her gift to hep connect parents to their kids in powerful ways.

Through the generosity of the Nor-Cal association of NAB churches, Care Lodi has been able to leverage the local church in a truly powerful way. It is our hope to be able to continue this partnership and see the local church continue this missionally groundbreaking effort. From the bottom of our hearts, THANK YOU for your involvement!
